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## The new school year

If your child is late to school, after the gate closes at 8.50am, please will you bring your child in and sign them in to school. Children should not be left at the school gate to walk in on their own.

We will be continuing with our high expectations of uniform. We believe that school uniform helps to maintain high standards of appropriate dress and creates a school identity. We are proud of our distinctive royal blue uniform, worn with grey trousers or skirt. The uniform is practical, comfortable and easily washable and should be worn by all the children.

Boys and girls with long hair need to tie it back. No makeup, fake tan, nail polish, false nails or tattoo stickers to be worn at any time.

### School Uniform:

- Royal blue jumper or cardigan
- Grey trousers or skirt (no jogging bottoms or leggings or jeans)
- Grey or white socks or tights
- White shirt or blouse
- School tie (KS1 and KS2)
- Black shoes, black trainers or black leather boots with no heels. No sandals, peep-toe shoes, fabric boots [Converse or Uggs] or heels should be worn.

### Summer Uniform:

- Tailored grey shorts or trousers (No jogging bottoms, leggings or jeans)
- Light blue and white checked dress
- White shirt or blouse

#### School PE Kit:

- Blue or white T-shirt
- Blue shorts
- Black plimsolls or black trainers



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 For outdoor PE during the colder weather, navy blue or black jogging bottoms or leggings may be worn

Jewellery: Only plain silver or gold stud earrings and a watch may be worn. No other jewellery is allowed. These should be removed for P.E. Children should be able to remove these.



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## Reception



Reception has had an amazing first half term in school. They have all made a successful start and settled extremely well. They are quickly adjusting to school life, routines and expectations. They have enjoyed exploring in our inside and outside learning environment as well as around the school. We participated in Harvest

Festival, met the guinea pigs and had fun on the school bus. We are enjoying our daily phonic lessons and love our play to learn time that we have every day. We had a fantastic time in our first Forest School and PE sessions too.

## Year 1

Year 1 has had a busy half term. In science, we discovered what a scientist does and explored the different equipment that they use. We even made our very own potions!









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In English, we have been reading 'The Gruffalo.' We followed clues to find out about the character and then used playdoh to create a model of him. We practised writing sentences and made some Wanted posters.





In Maths, we have been deepening our understanding of numbers up to 10. We have been counting, matching, finding one more and less and using mathematical vocabulary such as greater than to compare.











## Year 2

Year 2 had a delightful afternoon when Mrs Wright and her young son came to visit. We have been learning about animal life cycles, including humans in Science lessons. We wrote questions about the care and growth of babies to ask Mrs Wright. We learned a lot about the changes that occur as humans grow.









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## Year 3 and Year 4

The children have settled well into their new classes and have worked really hard across all areas of the Curriculum.

Elm Class have had Forest school this term with Ms Emma and have enjoyed learning outside the classroom, making giant spider webs as well as some spider art.





In music, the children have been learning to play a boomwhacker. These are long tubes with different musical notes which the children have learnt to play in tune to produce an accompaniment to a piece of Jazz music.





Willow Class have started their swimming lessons down at Eltham College - the children are enjoying these lessons although not the walk back to school after.

Beech Class have worked hard on their landscape art this term, looking at the work of Van Gogh and Lowry. We focussed on their style and tried to recreate this in our own pieces.





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## Year 5 and Year 6

Year 5/6 have had a fantastic start to the year and we are so proud of every single one of them. We have looked at Macbeth and Skellig in English this term. Skellig follows a young boy called Michael, who is adjusting to his new house, when he discovers a mysterious owl-man living in his garage. With the help of his new friend Mina, the pair try to help Skellig, whilst keeping him a secret from Michael's parents. We have used Skellig as inspiration in our writing and have all worked really hard to create excellent setting descriptions and diary entries.

The Year 5's have been having a fantastic time at Kingswood and have had the opportunity to participate in a variety of exciting team-building activities: such as night-line and the leap of faith. The

children have been practicing their listening and communication skills with each other in a variety of different scenarios.





### PE and Sport



It has been a busy start to the year for sport and PE! Some of our year 4 girls took part in a football competition. They showed fantastic resilience, perseverance and fair play. There were some amazing defending skills and goal saves, as well as good footwork and striking. Our year 6 children participated in a netball tournament. We were really proud of how well they worked as a team against other schools.

We held a cricket competition to celebrate the start of the world cup.

Children researched a country and then answered a range of questions.

Congratulations goes to Elm for getting all of the questions correct. They will receive a cricket certificate and extra playtime with a range of sports equipment.



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Some of our children also had the opportunity to attend a cricket festival where they learnt a range of new skills including batting and bowling.









## **Word of the Term**

As a school, we have begun to follow the Word Aware programme to teach vocabulary.

Word Aware is a structured whole school approach to promote the vocabulary development of all children.

There is clear evidence between children's vocabulary and language development and their success through school and beyond.

'Children who are behind in language development at **age five** are **six times less likely** to reach the expected standard in English at age eleven, and **11 times less likely** to achieve the expected level in maths.' *Department for Education, 2017* 

'The correlation between vocabulary size and life chances is as firm as any correlation in educational research. Vocabulary is important because it embodies and communicates concepts.' Ofsted 2019

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




### Free School Meals - vouchers

As you are probably aware, the provision of weekly £15 food vouchers during school holidays is continuing for any child who is eligible for benefits related free school meals.

Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are able to get free school meals. This is for <u>all</u> children no matter what you earn or benefits you receive. This is claimed automatically by the school and is called Universal Free School Meals.

If you receive any of the qualifying benefits below, you may qualify for free school meals, regardless of which year group your child is in. The school will also receive additional funding known as Pupil Premium.

You should still make a claim, if you can, even if your child is in Reception, Year 1 or Year 2.

If you get any of the following benefits, it helps your child **and the school** when you make a claim.

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child is eligible for free school meals, they will remain eligible until they finish the phase of schooling (primary or secondary) they are in on 31 March 2022.

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## **School Office Notices**

- Please ensure that all changes in collection arrangements for your child are phoned into the school office before 2:45pm.
- All paid school services must be paid for in advance (breakfast club, after school club, school dinners). The school has credit control procedures in place for any arrears.
- If you need to book breakfast club or after school club on an ad hoc basis, please email the relevant club in advance. Payment on ParentPay must be made before your child attends and does not automatically notify the club that your child will be attending.
- Please could all late arrivals be signed in at the school office.
- If children are not collected by 3:30pm and the school has not received notification from a parent or guardian, they will be taken to the after school club. This is a chargeable service.
