Reception

We have enjoyed learning about 'Real Life' Superheroes this half term and their important role in our community. We have also been thinking and observing seasonal changes at Forest School and when we have had some recent deep frosts.







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Year 1

This half term year 1 went on a walk around Elmstead Woods. We used a map and compass to help us follow a route. We spotted lots of landmarks on the way including the gate, signposts, bridge and a gnome house. We talked about seasonal changes and experienced leaves falling off trees. It was a little bit chilly but we were wrapped up warm!







Year 2



Year 2 visited St Edward's Church last week to learn about the importance of advent for Christians. Reverend Catherine talked to the children about how Christians prepare for Christmas and told them the story of the birth of Jesus. The children were able to see an advent wreath which they had learned about in school. They also had a lot of fun looking at the scene

depicting some of the characters from the first Christmas.



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Year 3 and Year 4

Beech, Elm and Willow classes have worked hard this half term, especially learning lines and songs for two performances! They have really enjoyed reading Krindlekrax, which inspired them when they were faced with the challenge of writing a diary entry and a newspaper article. The children have learnt a lot about the UK this half term, as they have covered the topic in Geography, so used the opportunity to use their new knowledge to write a non-chronological report. The children have had a great first term overall, and look forward to a well-earned rest before coming back in January to some exciting and challenging topics across our subjects.

Year 5 and Year 6

Year 5/6 have had a fantastic and busy half term. In writing, we have been focusing on our class text, Private Peaceful, which related to our learning of WW1 in history. The children have all worked very hard to write a persuasive speech to convince all the young men in the area to join the war: engaging in lots of class based discussion.

In art, the children have looked at perspective when drawing and have been working to produce different cityscapes, based on Steven Wiltshire's art work. We have also learnt how to draw Manga style artwork. In P.E., we have been working on river crossing, which has allowed us to strengthen our communication skills.


Word of the Term

Word Fact/Advice

This one is for adults only! Listen to yourself when you talk to your child. Who does most of the talking? Who does the listening? Who asks the questions? Children's language develops more when adults follow the child's interests, use comments instead of questions and really show they are listening. Set yourself a little target such as: giving your child more time to answer, comment more and question less, talk about things that interest your child. It's not as easy as it sounds, but really worth the effort.

Interesting/Unusual Words - Quiddle

Quiddle: to spend time on trivial tasks as a way of avoiding the important ones.



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Times Table Rockstars (TTRS) and Numbots



Children in year 2 upwards have been working hard on Times Table Rockstars.

We have had weekly interclass competitions, individual

winners and other prizes.

Well done to the classes and students that have won so far.

Below is some information on some of the different games.

Garage – This is the main mode the children should play. The questions will only come from the times tables the teacher has set for the week or they have been set based on their gig. As pupils start to answer questions, TT Rock Stars works out which facts they take longer on and will give them more of these questions to answer.

Jamming - children choose their questions.

Studio - the questions in the Studio can be anything from 2x2 up to 12x12. TT Rock Stars calculates each the mean speed from their last 10 games in the Studio and translates into a Rock Status.

Sound check - this is can be anything from 2x2 up to 12x12 but will be in the format of the year 4 multiplication check.

There are also multi-player modes: Rock Arena - The Arena allows players to compete against all other members of their Band/Class (their Band mates would need to join the same game in order to compete together).

Rock Festival - The Rock Festival games are open to players from around the world. The questions are selected at random from 2x2 to 12x12.

It is recommended that your child does a little bit of times table practice every night. Short bursts of practise on a daily basis are more effective than spending hours once a week.



All children in KS1 and KS2 have access to Numbots. It is geared more for KS1 children but all children can engage with the programme. We have been awarding certificates in assembly for children who have been participating regularly.



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ABOUT NUMBOTS	
What is NumBots?	NumBots is an online maths learning platform that helps children learn how to add and subtract, improving their fluency and recall in basic mental maths, and equipping them with maths confidence.
Why is NumBots important?	Basic number skills are the essential building blocks for higher-level maths concepts. NumBots covers number recognition, number bonds, and addition and subtraction of double digit numbers; gradually helping your child to build a solid conceptual understanding of number sense.
How often should my child play?	We recommend a little and often approach; 3 minutes practice a day, 4 times a week is a good target.

- Please ensure that all changes in collection arrangements for your child are phoned into the school office before 2:45pm.
- All paid school services must be paid for in advance (breakfast club, after school club). The school has credit control procedures in place for any arrears.
- If you need to book breakfast club or after school club on an ad hoc basis, please email the relevant club in advance. Payment on ParentPay must be made before your child attends and does not automatically notify the club that your child will be attending.
- Please could all late arrivals be signed in on the EntrySign in the entrance hall.
- If children are not collected by 3:30pm and the school has not received notification from a parent or guardian, they will be taken to the after school club. This is a chargeable service.
